- 97% report delaying use of any drug
- 50% of those who reported using substances at the start of our programs, stated that they had quit

She's Crazy: Mental Health & Other Myths is an edutainment event written and performed by three women with personal experiences, featuring song, humor, and personal stories, with the goal of reducing stigma. The event was coupled with a community conversation about mental health from various perspectives, including a college student and local provider.

A partnership including the Butler County Mental Health & Addiction Recovery Services Board, General Health District, Miami University, Fitton Center for Creative Arts, and Ohio Department of Mental Health & Addiction Services resulted in bringing this unique event that educated, entertained, and engaged.

The Local Outreach to Suicide Survivors/Drug Overdose Survivor Support (LOSS/DOSS) team's mission is to provide healing support to the bereaved by suicide and drug overdose.

Postvention is prevention:

In addition to supporting healing, the goal is to reduce the increased risk of suicide and drug overdose by the survivors. A LOSS/DOSS volunteer can help to shorten the time a survivor seeks help from 4 ½ years to 45 days!





Agents of Change members are teens from across Butler County who lead prevention efforts with support from Adult Allies. They took their advocacy efforts to the next level this past year by:

- Advocating at a city council meeting for fewer marijuana dispensaries to be placed in a community
- Planning & implementing a youth town hall in Middletown, advocating for more mental health resources, adding diversity & inclusion efforts, & more substance misuse education in their schools
- Participating in an Ohio Youth in Government weekend, where they were voted to take on different roles and met with Ohio's Governor and First Lady, Mike and Fran DeWine.



17STRONG!, Hamilton's resident-led movement that celebrates and unites each of the city's unique 17 neighborhoods, honored Envision Partnerships with the Non-Profit of the Year award at their annual summit this spring.

Gambling availability, accessibility, & normalization has increased rapidly. Youth & emerging adultsroughly ages 18-25- are highly vulnerable to ads & inducements, as well as increased gamblification of video games popular with these age groups. We are leading the way in addressing this emerging health issue.

- Butler County Problem Gambling Action Coalition was started with the Butler County MHARS Board
- We received a national Agility Grant to develop an educational program for emerging adults.
- Staff presented at the Problem Gambling Network of Ohio's annual conference & a national thinktank style event called the Emerging Adults Gambling Summit, and at Youth Gambling: Is Prevention Keeping Up? conference in Oslo, Norway.

By the numbers:

- 2,105 Youth educated in 144 classrooms & community settings
- 603 Adults educated through 26 presentations over the past year





COMMUNITY MEDIATION





Mediation and Problem Solving (MaPS) is a new extension of our Youth & Family Mediation Program that has been around for 30+ years. MaPS provides a safe, confidential space to address issues like youth-to-youth conflict, truancy, challenges at school, and family conflict.

Participants work through a trained mediator to address the issue and underlying circumstances, resulting in a plan that they come up with together. We are looking to continue expansion beyond Fairfield and Middletown this year. Past year highlights:

- 73% of students reported improved grades
- 78% of students said they were better at regulating emotions
- 80% of school personnel reported less student-tostudent conflicts
- 78% of school personnel reported improved behavior





HEALTHY HAMILTON



The inaugural **Healthy Hamilton Neighborhood Games** was a true coalition event. Held over two weeks in June at parks across the city, over 500 youth & adults played games that were heart-pumping fun. Six games-soccer kick, hula hoop, jump rope, badminton, disc golf, and obstacle course-combined a little skill, some fitness, & a lot of fun.

City of Hamilton's Health Department took the lead within the coalition by organizing & contributing grant funds & human resources to make this first year such a success. Other major coalition partners included City of Hamilton Department of Neighborhoods, 17STRONG!, Hamilton Parks Conservancy, Great Miami Valley YMCA, Hamilton City Council & City Schools.


