Mental health and addiction services are available to Butler County citizens through local certified mental health and addiction recovery provider agencies.

Additionally, the Board through partnerships, collaboration and the convening of stakeholders will use this funding to support its county providers. These designated programs and services will address prevention, treatment and recovery of Mental and Addiction Health for Individuals, families and communities in need of such local services.

Behavioral Health Service Definitions

**Behavioral Health examines how behaviors impact someone's health physically and mentally.*

MH = Mental Health
SUD = Substance Use Disorder

Consultation- A formal and systematic exchange of information to improve conditions that adversely affect one's behavioral health.

Crisis Services- Provides assistance in an urgent behavioral health situation to safely de-escalate an individual or situation, determine appropriate treatment services, and coordinate the follow through to minimize any psychological trauma.

Employment Support- Promotes recovery to obtain and maintain employment by providing training and skill development that is goal-oriented, ability-based, and increases self-sufficiency.

Guardianship- Services available to a client deemed incompetent by the Butler County Probate Court, age 18 and older. To be eligible for a guardianship, a medical doctor, psychiatrist, or psychologist must complete an expert evaluation deeming a client incompetent.

Housing (MH)- Characterized as a safe and healthy living environment that promotes mental health recovery and stability.

Information & Referral- A point of contact that assists in providing information regarding behavioral health services available in Butler County including services offered, where services are located, and agency contact information.

Justice Related Services- Programs that support individuals who are court-involved or who are currently incarcerated including assessments, drug or mental health courts, as well as access to treatment and recovery support services.

Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT)- The use of medication(s) in combination with counseling and behavioral therapies to provide both a whole patient and best practice approach to the treatment of substance use disorders.

Peer Support- Community-based services provided by a certified support specialist for individuals with a behavioral health disorder. Consists of activities that promote recovery, self-determination, self-advocacy, well-being and independence.

Prevention/Education- Formal presentations focused on preventing and reducing the incidence, prevalence, and/or severity of specific types of behavioral health disorders.

Psychiatric Medication- Used to stabilize and reduce mental health symptoms with the goal of improved mental health functioning and quality of life. Best practice suggests medication is likely more effective when used in conjunction with other behavioral health services such as counseling.

Recovery Housing (SUD)- Characterized as a safe and healthy living environment that promotes abstinence from alcohol and/or illicit drugs.

Residential Treatment (MH)- Therapeutic services provided at a live-in facility to an individual with mental health disorder(s) who require supervision and support with the goal of transitioning into independent living in the community.

Residential Treatment (SUD)- Therapeutic services provided at a live-in facility to an individual with substance use disorder(s) who require supervision and support with the goal of transitioning into independent living in the community.

Social Recreation- Includes structured and non-structured activities and supports to enhance the quality of life of the person served.

Outpatient Mental Health- Structured individual and group mental health activities and services that are provided by a certified treatment program. Services include, but are not limited to, the following: assessment, counseling, psychiatric medication services, and case management.

Outpatient Substance Use Disorder- Structured individual and group substance use disorder activities that are provided at a certified treatment program. Services can include, but are not limited to, the following: assessments, counseling, MAT, and case management.

Withdraw Management (SUD)- Medically managed SUD services to discontinue alcohol and/or illicit drug use to become medically stable.

Youth & Young Adults- Specialized services that are offered to transitional aged youth (ages 16-24).

Addiction Recovery Services

Substance Use Treatment (Adults): This holistic program supports individuals 18 and older using a biopsychosocial approach that addresses physical, emotional, social, interpersonal, and spiritual well-being. Services include group and individual counseling, 12-step support, physician coordination, random drug screening, case management, and family involvement. Referrals to community resources are provided as needed.

Substance Use Treatment (Adolescents) The Seven Challenges ®: An evidence-based program designed to help youth with substance use disorders make thoughtful decisions about change. It simultaneously addresses drug use along with co-occurring emotional, behavioral, and social challenges. The Seven Challenges ® is listed on the SAMHSA National Registry of Evidence-Based Programs and Practices.

Regional Harm Reduction Collaborative (RHRC): Serves Butler, Brown, Clermont, Clinton, and Warren Counties by promoting harm reduction strategies that improve community and individual health, RHRC focuses on reducing overdose deaths, disease transmission, trauma, stigma, and barriers to care. Mental Health Services

Dialectical Behavior Therapy (DBT): An evidence-based approach focused on helping clients manage emotional and cognitive triggers, strengthen self-regulation, and develop effective coping skills to reduce undesired behaviors and outcomes.

Mental Health Court Grant: In partnership with Butler County's justice system, this program provides early intervention and treatment linkage for individuals with mental health needs involved in the legal system. Includes collaboration with Area III Mental Health Court and outreach to Middletown Municipal Court and Jail.

School Based Therapy: Provides on-site mental health counseling in local schools, including Middletown and Monroe elementary, and high schools.

Play Therapy: Used with children and adolescents to treat behavioral health issues and assist with processing challenging life experiences through developmentally appropriate therapeutic play.

Specialized Services

Co-Occurring Treatment: Provides intensive outpatient treatment for adolescents and adults diagnosed with both a mental health disorder and a substance use disorder, ensuring integrated care for complex clinical needs.

Cognitive Processing Therapy (CPT): A structured, evidence-based approach for treating PTSD and associated symptoms such as depression, anxiety, guilt, and shame. Delivered in 12 weekly sessions (individual or group) to enhance daily functioning and trauma recovery.

Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing (EMDR): A well-researched, integrative treatment proven effective for trauma. EMDR incorporates elements from various therapeutic approaches and follows standardized protocols to support emotional processing.

Community-Based Collaborative Services

New Life Mission: Access Counseling staff are on-site at New Life Mission (Monday – Thursday, 8 a.m. – 2 p.m.) to provide outreach, assessment, therapy, psychiatry, case management, and linkage to housing, food, and other community resources.

Serve City (Hamilton, OH): Staff provide on-site mental health and addiction assessments, therapy, psychiatric care, and case management services aimed at stabilizing housing, income, and benefits.

YWCA (Hamilton, OH): Access Counseling provides trauma-informed mental health and addiction treatment, including EMDR case management, and on-site psychiatric care for residents who may otherwise need to travel for services.

Evidence-Based Group Interventions

“Structured Sensory Interventions for Traumatized Children, Adolescents and Parents” (SITCAP): SITCAP ® is an evidence and sensory based program that teaches mind-body skills to help clients process trauma. Focuses on core trauma themes such as safety, fear, anger, and recovery, while educating on the neurodevelopmental impact of trauma on memory, behavior, and emotional regulation.

Incredible Years ® Program: Designed for children ages 0 – 12, this evidence-based curriculum enhances emotional regulation, social competence, and reduces aggression. Services include parent, teacher, and child training components to build stronger family and school relationships.

Addiction Recovery Services

Inpatient Withdrawal Management: Provides 24/7 supervised detoxification services for adults with substance use disorders. Includes psychiatric and medical evaluations, therapeutic and recreational groups, social services, discharge planning, and access to MAT when appropriate.

Residential Treatment (21 – 30 days): Structured inpatient program for adults with substance use disorders. Services include psychiatric and medical evaluations, intensive daily group therapy, relapse prevention planning, social services, and discharge coordination. MAT may be included. *(Note: Not all insurance plans cover residential services.)*

Partial Hospitalization Program (PHP): Offered to both adults and adolescents, this intensive outpatient program provides group therapy 5 – 6 days a week, 5 – 6 hours per day. Includes a psychiatric evaluation within the first 48 program hours and weekly psychiatric follow-up. Typically consists of 10 – 15 sessions. Adolescent programming includes academic support.

Intensive Outpatient Program: Provides structured group therapy 3 – 5 days a week for 3 hours a day. Available for both adults and adolescents. Includes psychiatric evaluation within 48 program hours and monthly psychiatric follow-up. Typically includes 18 – 20 sessions. Adult programming is available during both daytime and evening hours.

Mental Health Services

Inpatient MH Treatment: Acute inpatient care for adults requiring psychiatric stabilization in a secure hospital setting. Services include comprehensive psychiatric and medical evaluations, therapeutic and recreational groups, social services, and discharge planning.

Partial Hospitalization Program (PHP): Intensive day treatment for adults and adolescents involving group therapy 5 – 6 days a week for 5 – 6 hours daily. Includes psychiatric evaluation within 48 program hours and weekly follow-up. Youth services also provide academic support. Typically consists of 10 – 15 sessions.

Intensive Outpatient Program (IOP): Group-based therapy for adults and adolescents, held 3 – 5 days per week for 3 hours per session. Includes psychiatric evaluation within 48 program hours and monthly follow-up. Typically includes 18 – 20 sessions.

Specialized Services

Help for Heroes (Inpatient): Dedicated inpatient treatment for first responders, active-duty military, and veterans addressing mental health and substance use needs. Programming reflects the unique occupational culture of this population and includes collaboration with command structures, employers, and peer support networks as needed.

Help for Heroes (Outpatient PHP/IOP): Partial Hospitalization and Intensive Outpatient treatment options tailored to first responders, active-duty military, and veterans. Services include psychiatric evaluation within 48 program hours, regular psychiatric follow-up (weekly for PHP, monthly for IOP), and coordination with command / employer / peer networks. Sessions are scheduled in the afternoons to accommodate shift work. Typically includes 18 – 20 sessions.

Specialized Prevention Services

Community-based Mentoring: Provides evidence-based, one-to-one mentoring relationships for children facing adversity. Volunteer mentors undergo thorough screening and training and receive ongoing support from program staff. Children, families, and mentors are supported throughout the match.

While awaiting a match, children are invited to participate in *Club of Unmatched Littles (COUL)* activities. These events occur bi-weekly during the summer and twice monthly during the school year, offering free, enriching and fun experiences.

Big Futures: A mentoring program for high school aged youth that focuses on relationship building, goal setting, and career exploration. Participants engage in monthly field trips to local businesses and organizations to broaden exposure to future opportunities.

Side Based Mentoring: Provides one-to-one mentoring in a structured group setting at schools. Each mentor is matched with one child, and all matches meet together after school with program staff present to facilitate activities and ensure a supportive environment.

Mental Health Services

Crisis Consultation & Intervention (CCI): Provides immediate support to individuals in Butler County experiencing acute mental health emergencies. This safety-net service offers urgent assessment and intervention to help stabilize individuals in crisis.

Mobile Response and Stabilization Services (MRSS): Available to families with youth and young adults up to age 22 who are experiencing emotional or behavioral distress. MRSS responds within 60 minutes of contact and provides up to 45 days of in-home crisis stabilization and linkage to ongoing community supports.

Health Now Integrated Care Management: A care coordination program for children, adolescents, and adults with behavioral health conditions. Staff work collaboratively with medical and behavioral providers to improve overall health outcomes, promote wellness, and teach self-management skills. *(Note: Available only to Medicaid-eligible individuals with qualifying diagnoses.)*

Uplift Senior Services: An evidence-based program serving adults 60 and older who experience depression or anxiety. Based on the PEARLS (Program to Encourage Active, Rewarding Lives) model, Uplift offers 8 in-home sessions over 5 – 6 months focused on problem-solving skills and increasing engagement in pleasurable activities.

WINGS Intensive Home-based Treatment: Designed for youth ages 0 – 18 at risk of out-of-home placement. WINGS provides intensive, community-based behavioral health services, functioning as both a step-up for youth needing more than outpatient care and a step-down for those transitioning from residential treatment. Services are delivered by a low-caseload team through frequent therapeutic interventions.

Workplace Associates Program: Supports individuals ages 16 and older with behavioral health challenges in obtaining and maintaining employment. Services include vocational assessments, job try-outs, individualized placement, on-site or remote job coaching, and long-term job retention support.

Harbor House Social Club: A recovery-oriented community program for adults with behavioral health conditions. Harbor House helps individuals build social connections, life skills, and community integration to improve quality of life.

Outpatient Mental Health Services: Comprehensive mental health services delivered in individual and group formats. Includes clinical assessment, therapy, psychiatric medication management, and case coordination through certified treatment providers.

Mental Health Services

Early Childhood Mental Health Consultation: Provides consultation services to childcare centers, staff, and families to support the mental and emotional development of children ages 0 – 5.

Outpatient Counseling: Offers bilingual (English and Spanish) mental health counseling services in-person and via telehealth to individuals and families.

Outpatient Psychiatry: Provides psychiatric evaluations and medication management in both English and Spanish through the Cincinnati office.

Specialized Services

Immigration Legal Services: Offers professional legal representation for immigration cases, including clinical evaluations for immigration court. Also provides case management for newly arrived families through Refugee Settlement Services and Su Casa Hispanic Center.

AccuracyNow Language Services: Delivers professional interpretation and translation services to support linguistically diverse communities.

Parent Education: Provides classes designed to strengthen parenting skills and promote healthy family relationships.

Senior Companion Program: Pairs older adults with trained volunteers who provide companionship and assist with daily living tasks, helping seniors maintain independence in their homes.

Foster Grandparents Program: Connects seniors with opportunities to mentor and support vulnerable children through structured volunteer service.

Caregiver Assistance Network: Offers educational resources, peer support, and group meetings for individuals providing care to loved ones with physical or mental health challenges.

Addiction Recovery Services

Ambulatory Detox: Provides outpatient detoxification for individuals with opioid use disorders using over-the-counter and prescribed medication in a safe, comfortable setting. Treatment typically lasts 5 – 7 days.

Partial Hospitalization (PHP): A structured outpatient program meeting 5 days a week for 4 hours a day. Services include evidence-based group therapy, individual counseling, case management, and urinalysis testing.

Intensive Outpatient (IOP): Clients attend group therapy 3 – 4 days per week for 2 – 3 hours, based on clinical severity. Individual counseling, case management, and urinalysis testing are also provided.

Outpatient Treatment: Group sessions are held twice a week for 2 hours, includes individual therapy, case management, urinalysis, and optional safety-focused and cognitive behavioral therapy groups.

Relapse Prevention: Meets weekly for 2 hours and focuses on teaching relapse prevention strategies through evidence-based interventions. Includes individual counseling, case management, and urinalysis.

Jail Based Services: Provides assessments, IOP, individual counseling, and case management to inmates in the Butler County Jail.

Jail Outreach Program: Supports reentry for individuals with substance use disorders transitioning from jail, with a focus on community reintegration and service linkage.

Treatment Alternatives for Safer Communities (TASC): Offers assessment, case management, and referral services to justice-involved individuals with substance use disorders.

Peer Support Services: Certified peers assist individuals transitioning from incarceration or entering treatment, offering community support and service navigation.

The Teen Intervention Program (TIP): Serves youth under 18 with mental health or substance use needs. Offers individual and family therapy, outpatient groups (twice weekly for 2 hours), SUD individual sessions, case management, and urinalysis as appropriate. All services are evidence-based.

MAT (Medication Assisted Treatment): For individuals with opioid or alcohol dependence. Medications include Vivitrol, Suboxone, and Sublocade, in combination with therapeutic support.

Mental Health Services

Mental Health Counseling: Provides treatment for mental health conditions using evidence-based approaches such as CBT, DBT, client-centered, and solution-focused therapies. Couples and family sessions are also available.

Case Management: Voluntary services for individuals with persistent and severe mental illness, often with co-occurring substance use. Services are primarily delivered in community settings.

Connection Program: A short-term initiative that connects Butler County residents to long-term mental health care particularly after hospitalization or incarceration. Offers interim medication management and case management to prevent decompensation.

Mental Health Housing: Supportive housing for individuals with mental illness who receive case management services and can pay rent. Housing is located throughout Butler County.

Day Treatment: Group programming for individuals with mental health diagnosis to develop coping skills, improve daily functioning, and engage with peers and the community.

Group Home Management: CBH contracts with group homes to service individuals with severe behavioral health challenges. Oversight includes monitoring care quality service coordination, and financial resource authorization.

Probate Monitor: Provides clinical monitoring and serves as a court liaison for adults under civil commitment through the Butler County Probate Court.

Forensic Monitor: Delivers court liaison and clinical oversight services for justice-involved individuals with mental illness who are incompetent to stand trial or not guilty by reason of insanity.

Sex Offender Treatment Program: Offers evidence-based group and individual therapy for clients with a history of sexual offenses.

Specialized Services

Anger Management (Men and Women): Gender specific groups for individuals with a history of anger-related legal issues. Programs include group education and optional individual counseling, using evidence-based practices.

Batterer's Intervention Program: Gender-specific group therapy for individuals with histories of intimate partner violence. Duration and format depend on individualized treatment plans. Includes group and individual sessions.

Corrective Thinking Group: 6-week program addressing antisocial and criminal thought patterns using the *True Thought* evidence-based curriculum. Each session lasts 90 minutes.

Theft Group: A 4-hour seminar for individuals with theft-related charges, using evidence-based content. Additional corrective thinking sessions may be recommended for underlying cognitive patterns.

Substance Use Education: For individuals with mild or no diagnosable substance use disorder. Services are delivered through group and/or individual sessions and include monitoring for signs of escalation.

Parenting Class: 7-week educational program for parents seeking to improve parenting skills and relationships with their children. Open to both men and women.

Diversion Program: Designed for individuals with misdemeanor charges such as open container, underage consumption, or drug paraphernalia violations. Includes a screening and one educational session.

Addiction Recovery Services

Intensive Outpatient Program (IOP): Provides structured outpatient treatment for individuals with substance use disorders. Services include group therapy, individual counseling, and recovery support.

Partial Hospitalization Program (PHP): A higher level of outpatient care offering intensive therapeutic services multiple days per week for several hours per day. Designed for individuals requiring more support than transitional outpatient programs.

Opioid Treatment Program: Both Butler County DeCoach locations offer on-site pharmacies where clients receive Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT). Medications are dispensed in-office, often at no cost to the client.

Specialized Services

Skilled Nursing Services: Delivers on-site education and treatment services to various skilled nursing facilities in Butler County, supporting residents with substance use treatment needs.

Court Services: Provides in-court assistance at any Butler County court, offering support and linkage to treatment for individuals involved in the legal system.

Integrated Peer Support: Deploys peer support specialists to two Butler County hospitals to assist patients in identifying and accessing appropriate substance use treatment resources.

Integrated FQHC Treatment: In partnership with Primary Health Solutions (a Federally Qualified Health Center), DeCoach provides on-site counseling for individuals enrolled in MAT services at Primary Health locations.

Prevention Services

Behavioral Health Prevention and Risk Reduction: Delivers strength-based interventions and risk-reduction strategies to promote behavioral health and prevent substance use. Services target both individuals and communities through direct and indirect methods.

Project Success: A comprehensive prevention program reaching youth and adults through universal, selective, and indicated strategies. Components include: classroom-based instruction; school and county-wide prevention initiatives; staff training and consultation; informal screenings and referrals; and parent education.

Youth & Community Development: Supports youth programs and community-based coalitions in developing, planning, and sustaining prevention efforts. Focuses on asset-building for youth and strengthening community advocacy around behavioral health.

Adult Prevention - Minimize Risk, Maximize Life: Educates Butler County adults about the Low-Risk Drinking Guidelines and standard drink definitions. Designed to promote informed, low-risk decision making regarding alcohol use through direct engagement and public education.

Butler County Gambling Prevention Project: Raises awareness of the personal and public health consequences of problem gambling. Priorities include: delaying gambling participation until legal age; preventing the onset of gambling problems through public education and risk reduction strategies.

Butler County Suicide Prevention Coalition: A collaborative initiative addressing suicide as a public health concern using current data and evidence-based strategies. Programs are available for youth and adults, and task forces focus on key populations including older adults, veterans, LGBTQ+ individuals, and those affected by suicide loss. Training is offered to help community members recognize mental health crises and make appropriate referrals.

Community Presentations: Customized presentations to increase awareness of mental health and addiction issues and their community impact. Presentations are built around four pillars of prevention: substance use, gambling, violence, and suicide.

Specialized Services

Camp Mariposa: An overnight program offered year-round for youth (ages 9-12) and teens (ages 13-16) impacted by a family member's substance use. Includes structured, therapeutic camp sessions and bi-monthly family activities during off-camp months.

Conflict Resolution / Problem Solving: Offers confidential mediation services to improve communication, repair relationships, and develop mutually agreed-upon solutions. Mediators serve as neutral third parties in cases involving families, peers, community members, and organizations.

Grief Support Group: Provides weekly support for individuals grieving the loss of a loved one due to suicide or drug overdose. Facilitated in a compassionate and understanding environment.

Specialized Services

Representative Payee Program: In partnership with the Social Security Administration, LifeSpan provides money management services for adults with disabilities or mental illness who are unable to manage their finances independently. This service ensures that rent, utilities, and other essential bills are paid on time to promote housing and financial stability.

A Private Pay Payee Program: Is also available for individuals who choose to have a payee manage their funds. This service assists with budgeting and bill payment using the client's deposited income.

Guardianship Program: LifeSpan provides court-appointed guardianship services for adults ages 18 and older who are unable to make personal, medical, or financial decisions due to disability or mental illness. Guardians offer support, oversight, and advocacy to ensure the individual's safety, stability, and well-being.

Mental Health Services

Family to Family Class: Free, 8-week evidence-based education program for family members and friends of individuals living with mental illness. Taught by trained volunteers with lived experience, the course covers treatment options, communication strategies, and self-care. Participants often find vital emotional support through connection with others facing similar challenges.

Family Support Group: A peer-led support group for family and friends of individuals affected by mental illness. Offers a safe, confidential space to share experiences, gain insight, and find encouragement.

NAMI Basics: A free, 6-week program for parents and caregivers and adolescents with emotional, behavioral, or neurobiological disorders. Focuses on fostering understanding, empowerment, and effective caregiving strategies.

Connection Recovery Support Group: A peer-led support group for adults living with mental illness. Provides a judgment-free space to share experiences, challenges, coping strategies, and successes with others on the path to recovery.

Community Engagement and Education

Community Forums: Quarterly educational events featuring guest speakers discussing mental health topics. Open to all adults; no registration is required. Forums begin at 6:30 p.m.

Community Presentations: NAMI staff and volunteers deliver tailored presentations to schools, organizations, and community groups to increase awareness and understanding of mental health and its impact on individuals, families, and the broader community.

Speakers' Bureau / In Our Own Voice: Volunteer speakers with lived experience share personal stories of recovery, resilience, and advocacy to reduce stigma and foster hope.

Special Events

NAMIWalks: Butler County's largest mental health awareness event, held annually on the second Saturday of October at the Fitton Center for Creative Arts in Hamilton, Ohio. Promotes Community engagement and support for mental wellness.

Suicide Prevention Walk: Held each year to raise awareness, honor lives lost to suicide, and promote hope and healing. This walk brings together survivors, advocates, and community members committed to preventing suicide and supporting mental health.

Annual Awards Dinner: Recognizes outstanding contributions by individuals and organizations that support mental health and addiction recovery efforts in Butler County and surrounding areas.

Outpatient Mental Health: Delivers individualized mental health services in the community as part of a comprehensive continuum of care. Services include assessment, treatment planning, case management, and therapy.

Psychiatric Services: Psychiatric evaluation and medication management are provided by medical staff to support symptom reduction and improved functioning.

Partial Hospitalization/Day Treatment (Grade K – 12): Provides daily group therapy in a structured, therapeutic environment to promote social-emotional development, behavioral regulation, and healthy peer relationships. Offered in educational settings within our partnering schools for youth requiring intensive support.

Education & Day Treatment: Combines academic instruction and therapeutic programming to help students develop positive behavioral, emotional, and social skills in a supporting learning environment.

Site Based, Home Based and Virtual Counseling Services (Ages 3 +): Offers individual, group, and family therapy in a variety of settings including school, home, office, and virtual, tailored to meet the needs of each child and family.

Young Adult Transitional Services: Supports youth transitioning into adulthood by providing guidance and access to housing, education, employment resources, and physical and mental wellness services.

Specialized Services

Residential Interventions (Ages 5 – 17): Provides a secure, highly structured residential setting for youth with severe emotional or behavioral needs. Focuses on stabilization, individualized treatment, and skill-building for long-term success.

Foster Care Services (Age 0 – 21): Offers therapeutic foster care placements for children and youth, with an emphasis on supporting those with behavioral health challenges. Homes are matched and supported by trained staff to ensure stability and healing.

Foster Parent Training (Ages 18+): Provides required training for new and existing foster parents to achieve and maintain state licensure in Ohio. Training equips caregivers with knowledge and skills to meet the needs of children in foster care.

Addiction Recovery Services

Intensive Outpatient Program (IOP): Offers comprehensive treatment 3 – 5 days per week, typically totaling 10 hours of therapeutic services. Programming includes evidence-based counseling, recovery planning, case management, and psychiatric support.

Partial Hospitalization Program (PHP): Provides more than 20 hours of structured outpatient care per week, including individual and group therapy, psychiatric services, and peer support. PHP serves as a step-down from inpatient care or as an alternative to hospitalization.

Outpatient Counseling:

- Individual Therapy: Personalized treatment addressing substance use and co-occurring mental health concerns
- Group Therapy: Structured clinical groups focused on education, skill-building, and peer support.
- Family Therapy: Supports healing and communication within families affected by substance use.

Residential Treatment: A 24/7 clinically supervised program for individuals at high risk for relapse or complications from withdrawal. Services include psychiatric and primary health care, along with wraparound supports. On-site childcare is available during clinical hours for mothers and children up to age 12.

Case Management: Assists clients in accessing housing, education, employment, medical care, and public benefits, supporting long-term recovery and stability.

Mental Health Services

Mental health care is fully integrated across all levels of programming. Clients have access to psychiatric evaluations, medication management, and individualized treatment for co-occurring disorders. Services are trauma-informed and recovery-oriented, promoting emotional wellness as a key part of sustained recovery.

Specialty Services

Opioid Treatment Program (MAT): Offers FDA-approved medications such as Methadone, Buprenorphine (Suboxone), and Naltrexone (Vivitrol) as part of a comprehensive Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT) approach. MAT services are combined with counseling and case management for whole-person care.

Perinatal Program: Provides targeted treatment and wraparound services for pregnant and postpartum women. Focuses on healthy parenting, bonding, prevention education, and long-term recovery. Medical care and outreach education for women of childbearing age are also included.

MAMAS (Motherhood and Maternity Addiction Services): Offers recovery housing, outpatient treatment, and case management for women transitioning from residential care with a focus on parenting, sobriety, and stability. Participants have continued access to medical and psychiatric care. Collaborative partnerships with local agencies provide additional support and resources.

Recovery Housing: Safe, structured, and supportive housing for individuals actively engaged in outpatient services. Recovery housing promotes stability, accountability, and independence, and is certified by Ohio Recovery Housing.

Court and Correctional Services: Delivers behavioral health services to justice-involved individuals, both incarcerated and court-supervised. Services include:

- On-site assessments in Butler, Clinton, Preble, and Warren County jails
- Walk-in assessments at the University Boulevard office
- Individualized treatment and case management through participation in Butler County's Specialty Courts, including:
 - Drug Court Docket (dedicated treatment provider)
 - SAMI Court (Substance Abuse and Mental Illness)
 - Family Recovery Court
 - Felony Non-Support Court
 - Veterans Treatment Court (VTC)

Mental Health Services

Behavioral Health Assessment: Comprehensive assessments are provided to identify individual behavioral health needs and inform appropriate treatment planning. Walk-in assessments are available Monday – Friday, 8:00 a.m. – 12:30 p.m. at both the Hamilton and Middletown locations. Telehealth assessments are also available by appointment. To schedule, call (513) 863-6383.

Case Management: Individualized support to enhance functioning and promote recovery in the community. Services may include needs assessment, daily living skills development, service coordination, system navigation, symptom monitoring, education, and behavioral interventions.

Counseling and Therapy: Therapeutic services to address mental health and addiction challenges that interfere with functioning at home, work, school, or in the community. Individual, group, and family counseling is available in person at the Hamilton and Middletown locations or via telehealth.

Psychiatric Services: Psychiatric evaluation and medication management are provided by medical staff to support symptom reduction and improved functioning. Nursing staff offer education, care coordination, and medication support. Services are available in person or via telehealth.

Specialized Services

PATH Program (Homeless Outreach): Projects for Assistance in Transition from Homelessness (PATH) provides outreach and engagement to individuals who are homeless or at risk of homelessness and have mental health needs. Services include connection to food, housing, employment, education, medical care, and other community resources. Referrals can be made by anyone.

Court Outreach: Supports individuals with severe and persistent mental illness who are involved in the criminal justice system. Referrals come from judges, attorneys, law enforcement, and family members. Transitional Living partners with Fairfield Municipal Treatment Alternative Court and other local courts.

Employment Success: In partnership with Butler County Job and Family Services and other local agencies, this program assists individuals in addressing barriers to employment. Service coordinators connect clients to behavioral health treatment, vocational training, and other supportive services to help achieve stable, meaningful employment.

Forensic Jail Services: Provides mental health support and crisis intervention for inmates at the Butler County Jail. Services include prevention education, crisis assessment, consultation, and linkage to community-based care upon release. This program operates in partnership with the Butler County Sheriff's Department.

Residential Mental Health Services: Provides 24/7 residential treatment for individuals whose mental health needs significantly impair independent living. The goal is to stabilize mental health symptoms, develop life skills, and support transition to independent community living.

Goodman Place – Permanent Supportive Housing: Provides permanent, supportive housing for chronically homeless individuals with disabilities, including serious mental illness and substance use disorders. Services include 24/7 staffing, on-site case management, life skills training, and referrals to community resources. This program is grounded in evidence-based models such as trauma-informed care, housing first, and harm reduction.

Dove House – Domestic Violence Shelter and Crisis Hotline: Dove House is Butler County's only emergency domestic violence shelter. The shelter operates 24/7/365 with one of the lowest barriers to entry in Ohio and is the first in the state to accept pets. Services include crisis intervention, trauma-informed care, safety planning, case management, and housing referrals. The 24-hour hotline is available at 1-888-618-6523.

Empowerment and Advocacy Services

Youth Empowerment Program (FIERCE): FIERCE (Fearless, Independent, Educated, Resilient, Confident, and Engaged) is offered in Hamilton City Schools and some surrounding Butler County Schools. The program focuses on healthy relationship education, social-emotional learning, and violence prevention, with special emphasis on BIPOC youth. Curriculum is evidence-based, trauma-informed, culturally responsive, gender-expansive, and strengths based.

Empowerment and Advocacy Initiatives: YWCA Hamilton leads programming focused on racial and social justice, health equity, and economic advancement. Key initiatives include:

- Black Maternal and Infant Health Advocacy: Partnering with healthcare and social service agencies to address disparities.
- Equity Alliance: A nonpartisan coalition responding to hate incidents and promoting inclusive community action.
- Economic Empowerment: Supporting minority-owned businesses and fostering economic inclusion.

All advocacy programs are rooted in cultural humility, promoting continuous learning, inclusion, and community transformation.
